President's Corner

I'll be out checking my night caches soon to ensure the markers haven't disappeared or been obscured over this summer – getting ready for all the winter-happy geocaching visits they can only enjoy when there's actually a 'dark night' out there.

Top Tens: Alaskan Cacher's Caching Achievements

This month's Top Ten list of Alaskan Cacher's Caching Achievements goes to the Alaskan Geocaches with the most Found It logs. Remember that quantity is not necessarily a measure of quality and most of these long-time caches are easily accessible to numerous tourists in order to boost their find counts. For fun, I'm also including the DNF and Favorite Point counts for each cache. As with all our Top Ten lists, only Alaskan caches are counted here. Found counts as of September 30, 2014.





- #1 Lil Miss Mollie = 2,213 Finds & 71 DNFs with 21 Favorite Points
- #2 Bin Caching TB Hotel = 2,132 & 36 DNFs with 63 Favorite Points
- #3 Camp Skagway No.1 (Virtual PMO) = 1,859 & 1 DNF with 179 Favorite Points
- #4 Anchorage Big Wild Life = 1,772 & 5 DNFs with 95 Favorite Points
- #5 Skagway cliffs (Virtual) = 1,585 & 24 DNFs with 133 Favorite Points
- #6 Revilla up Hilla = 1,295 & 23 DNFs with 28 Favorite Points
- #7 Museum Trading Post = 1,124 & 64 DNFs with 14 Favorite Points
- #8 Juneau Coin & Token Reserve = 1,123 & 12 DNFs with 15 Favorite Points
- #9 A Tribute to Patsy Ann = 1,019 & 118 DNFs with 73 Favorite Points
- #10 Denali Bruin Breath = 1,013 & 15 DNFs with 26 Favorite Points

The GeocacheAlaska! 2015 Nominating Committee will be working during the next several weeks to compile a ballot for election of the 2015 Board of Directors. The Nominating Committee is Cameron Gilchrist/AlaskaCariboozer (chair), Dana Rosso/DR-AK, Robert Burton/Burtonsinak, and Sean McErlane/MAC5115.

The 2015 election will be electing the Vice-President, Treasurer, and two member-at-large seats, all of which are for 2 year terms.

The nominating process and schedule is:

September 15-October 15: Accept nominations and explain Director responsibilities to nominees. Nominees prepare a Statement of Purpose detailing why they are running for a position and describing relevant experience. Candidates may nominate themselves or be nominated by another cacher by posting in this thread or e-mailing a member of the Nominating Committee.

October 16: Proposed ballot submitted to GeocacheAlaska! Board of Directors

November 1-November 15: Online elections open.

GeocacheAlaska! Inc. is a cacher/member-driven organization. The GeocacheAlaska! Board of Directors sets the agenda for the organization so it aligns with the mission defined in the By-laws. Members of the Board use their time on the Board to improve the Alaskan caching experience for all cachers.

The GeocacheAlaska! Board of Directors is looking for geocachers who enjoy all things geocaching and are ready to give back to the game from which they have obtained so much enjoyment. Do you or someone you know have the qualities it takes to be a successful Board member?

Attributes of successful Board members include:

- 1. Enthusiastic. Is the cacher gung-ho about geocaching and most everything geocaching?
- 2. Team-oriented. Does the cacher have an established track record of working effectively as a member of a team?
- 3. Helpful. Will this cacher bring a "how can I help" attitude?
- 4. Communicative. Can the cacher effectively communicate verbally and in writing?
- 5. Self-starting. Can this cacher recognize the need for something to be done and jump right in to get it done?
- 6. Inquisitive. Will the cacher ask clarifying questions if they don't understand something? Is the cacher eager to learn?
- 7. Assertive. Will the cacher provide feedback on most topics and push back or speak up if they don't agree with part of a discussion or a decision?
- 8. Reliable. Can the cacher be counted on to attend Board of Directors meetings and to routinely (at least every two or three days) check forum threads and e-mail and provide feedback or vote as needed? Can the cacher be counted on to complete tasks they volunteer to do or are assigned by the President?
- 9. Business-minded. Will the cacher bring business-savvy to the Board and be able to make decisions based on what is best for the organization rather than what may be easiest or most popular?
- 10. Computer savvy. Does the cacher know enough about computers and/ or smart phones to use the on-line resources required of Board members (forums, website, e-mail, vendor sites, etc.)?

2015 Board of Directors Nominations Now Being Accepted

The specific duties for the Directors up for election for 2015-2017 term are defined in the <u>By-laws</u>:

Vice President shall:

- Perform the duties of the President in the absence of the President.
- Make arrangements for scheduling meeting dates and locations.
- Supervise the Nominating Committee.
- Tabulate ballots for all GCAK! elections.

The tag is purple (magenta) and has a white wolf against a dark moon with a white band under the word "Alaska" and the tracking number. This etching pattern is different than all the other tags we are selling right now. This tag has two 5's and a 7 in the tracking number. Reviewer's Corner

Fall Maintenance

The Chugach peaks above Anchorage have termination dust which means the first snowfall at lower elevations is only a matter of days or weeks away. In anticipation of that snow which significantly impacts many cachers' outdoor explorations, I began the Autumn Sweep process over Labor Day Weekend. The sweep process involves identifying geocaches that may need attention and then posting a Reviewer Note on the affected cache page suggesting that the Cache Owner check on their cache before the snow makes cache maintenance more difficult.

Criteria for whether a cache needs attention include the period of time a temporarily disabled cache has been disabled, a growing string of Did Not Find (DNF) logs, the date of the Cache Owner's last online visit, and other factors. After posting a Reviewer Note, I will typically give the Cache Owner a month or more to respond before again looking at the cache page. If the Cache Owner does not respond to the Reviewer Note by performing Owner Maintenance or by writing a Note to the cache page explaining the reason the cache has not been maintained, I will usually archive the cache with an offer to unarchive the cache if the Cache Owner communicates with the caching community with status Notes to the cache page or directly with me via e-mail or an in-person conversation, so communication is key. I don't automatically archive caches on a set timeline because there are a number of extenuating circumstances (local construction, flooding, illness, slow replacement parts deliveries, etc.) for not maintaining a cache within days or weeks of an issue arising.

Remote Cache Placement

Switching topics, cachers must educate themselves about who owns/manages a potential cache location before they place a cache, especially if the cache is going to be placed in a remote area. For example, all caches on Adak Island are in danger of being archived because land on the island is either under the jurisdiction of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) or is *privately* held by the Aleut Native Corporation. USFWS has a very clear policy prohibiting

caches on refuge lands and as far as I know, the Aleut Native Corporation has not granted permission for caching on their lands. All potentially affected Cache Owners have been informed via a Reviewer Note on their cache pages of the need to obtain permission or remove their cache(s).

Also this past summer, there were several caches placed near McCarthy that could not be published. The land around McCarthy is either Wrangell-St. Elias National Park (where caches are not allowed) or *private inholding* (which requires *explicit* permission from the land owner to place a cache). So, know before you go, to avoid the frustration of placing a cache that cannot be published!

A cacher interested in placing a cache in a remote area can research land ownership/management at the <u>Alaska Public Lands Information Centers</u> in Anchorage and Fairbanks, by visiting the applicable City, State, and Federal websites, or by using the applicable online Geographic Information System (GIS) resources. Cachers may also contact me through my online profile and I will try to assist.


International EarthCache Day 2014
