Not Just A Boring Event with sillygirl & jrr

Sometimes a visit from folks Outside is what it takes for me to drop my normal routines and do something different that reminds me why I live where I live. When jrr of sillygrl and irr contacted me about hosting an event and expressed an interest in viewing the tidal bore, a quick consult of the tide table in my Oregon indicated we could pull off a combined event. I've seen the tidal bore many

times, but in recent years it's been by serendipity while hiking the ridges above Turnagain Arm, bicycling the Bird to Gird trail, or driving to and from points east and south. Plans were quickly finalized and the "save the date" Event page was published.

Our guests from our Hawaii brought near tropical weather with them and the day began beautifully. I got wrapped up in some last minute household chores and left for the event site without much slack time, made even less slack when I briefly returned to the house to pick up the mini-store. That extra delay put me about twentieth in line behind a Trooper road closure at McHugh Creek due to an especially nasty head-on collision. My phone's web browser would not cooperate, so I used text messages to let people know about the closure and to stay in touch with sillygrl, jrr, and NorthWes, who were already at or beyond Bird Point. Scobey picked up the feed and got the word out through Facebook. Fortunately, the injured were quickly treated by paramedics and transported to Providence hospital, a tow truck arrived, and the road reopened after about a forty-five minute delay.

Traffic was backed up all the way to Indian as I headed east and I eventu-

ally passed the bore tide at about the first GeocacheAlaska! Adopt-a-Highway sign, just in time to see a trio of stand-up paddleboarders catch the wave. I continued to ground zero where a dozen or so cachers were assembled for the show and walked down the rocks for a ringside seat of the incoming natural show. My 1530-1600 esti-



mate was about seven minutes off as the tidal bore rushed past at 1607ish, just after ftl-ak and DR-AK and family pulled up to swell our ranks. Photos were taken of the wave and the attendees and then I rushed off to Chair 5 to get group seating before the dinner rush.

Unfortunately, word about the accident had gotten out and the restaurant was already full. So, everyone did what cachers do when they have time to kill and went caching. Forty-five minutes later, we were seated and enjoyed a dinner with great fellowship, great food, bottomless glasses of ice tea and water, and a waiter that happily split our bill three ways even though he wasn't supposed to which earned him an especially generous tip.

Many thanks to everyone who attended or tried to attend for showing sillygrl and jrr Alaskanstyle aloha to make this anything but a "boring" event.

NOTE: Cachers wishing to quickly determine bore tide times can use the tide table in their GPS. The tide table For the Turnagain Arm Tidal Bore Earthcache may be found on the Garmin Orgeon or the Turnagain Arm Tidal Bore Earthcache by selecting Where to? > Tides > Sunrise, Turnagain Arm > tap the Sunrise, Turnagain Arm bar that appears at the top of the map > tap the screen and use the left and right arrow buttons to set the desired date. Then tap the check box to view the tide times. The tidal bore will pass after the indicated time, with how much later determined by the distance east of the Sunrise waypoint (use 7-15 mph to estimate the delay). The bore will be larger the lower the low tide and when bucking a headwind coming down the arm out of the east.




Whoop whoop !! A rare event for a shared FTF on a close to eleven year old cache, myself, rookie and a muggle

Jumping into July

I begin this month's column by recognizing the community spirit of the Juneau cachers. Akvoyager passed away last summer (obituary) and a local cacher worked with his family to obtain permission for his caches to be adopted out to keep his legacy of well-placed popular caches alive. With family permission received, several Juneau cachers divided Akvoyager's caches amongst themselves and worked through me with Groundspeak to make the adoptions happen. Their efforts resulted in fifteen caches with 153 favorite points living on throughout the Juneau area. More information about cache "estate planning" may be found in my column that appeared in the August 2014 issue of this newsletter which may be found on the GeocacheAlaska! website at http://www.geocachealaska.org/newsletters.htm.

Cache Owners may update the coordinates of their owned caches by up to 528' using the "Update Coordinates" log. If the coordinate update is required due to relocating the cache, please be diligent about verifying the new location meets the 528' proximity guideline. I receive a log of all coordinate changes and spot check them. If a cache has been relocated too close to another cache, I will disable the cache page and request the Cache Owner to relocate the cache to a location that is proximity guideline compliant.

Geocachers are reminded to consider the "family friendly" aspect of geocaching when planning cache placements and cache page content. Placement near "adult" entertainment clubs, bars, and rougher parts of town should be reconsidered. If you wouldn't take your spouse, significant other, son, daughter, niece, nephew or mother to a location, why would you bring cachers there? Cache page content featuring explicit or implied "adult" content, violence, profanity, etc. is not allowed. A good measure is whether you would be comfortable with those close to you looking over your shoulder when you are viewing the cache page or sitting in the car when you visit the cache location.

There are about four hundred caches in Alaska with the "Needs Maintenance" attribute on the cache page and many of those caches are actually in fine shape. Groundspeak has reversed its policy regarding Reviewer's clearing the "Needs Maintenance" attribute on a cache page that is not being maintained by the Cache Owner. If you find a cache that has the "Needs Maintenance" attribute and the cache is in good condition (or you performed community maintenance to return the cache to good condition), you may notify me through the new geocaching.com instant messaging system or via e-mail through my profile and I can toggle off the attribute.

Cachers are again reminded that the "Needs Maintenance" log type should only be used if you have found the cache and it needs care. If you don't find the cache, the "didn't find it" or DNF log is the appropriate log. A cacher can't possibly know if a cache needs maintenance if they didn't find the cache, nor can they know the cache is missing because they didn't find it.

STATE PARKS PERMITS

Caches may be published within Alaska State Parks! All caches must have the permit number on the inside of the cache along with the cache owner's contact information. On the outside of the cache, you must write "Alaska State Parks Permit #15-KA-1994 Geocache AK" in permanent marking. The cache listing must state "Cache placed under GeocacheAlaska! Park Use Permit #15-KA-1994" within the description section. Before submitting a cache listing within one of the parks, please thoroughly read the complete list of stipulations in the permit, which may be downloaded from the GeoacheAlaska! website.
