I'm running for another term as President, with the intention to support the Board of Directors of Alaska's only statewide geocaching organization in meeting the organization's goals and objectives.



## Know Before You Go (part 4) & Autumnal Reaping

A representative of Gold Cord Mine, Mountain Heather Investments LLC, contacted me and requested archival of a dozen geocaches that were on private land without permission in the Hatcher Pass area. An increase in active gold mining that includes surface blasting which creates a public safety hazard and geocachers' reluctance to leave the area even when warned about their trespass and immanent blasting prompted the request.

Land ownership information in Hatcher Pass and the entire Mat-Su Borough may be found <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>. You will have to manually zoom close enough into the area of interest to see the parcel boundaries and select Measure, Location and pick Degrees or DMS. Coordinates will display when moving the cursor on the map and one can click a specific location on the map to "lock" the coordinates in the display window. Geocaching.com uses the DD MM.MMM coordinate format, so the user will need to convert between that format and the format used on the site (by dividing the seconds by sixty to obtain the ".MMM" part of the DD MM.MMM coordinate format or multiplying the ".MMM" part of the DD MM.MMM coordinate format by sixty to obtain the seconds). Additional property ownership information may be found on the Mat-Su Borough website here and here.

Geocachers are reminded that the Guidelines require obtaining permission from the Land Owner before placing a geocache. All known Land Manager agreements and links to other Land Ownership resources are located on the GeocacheAlaska! Land Manager webpage at <a href="http://www.geocachealaska.org/landmanagers.htm">http://www.geocachealaska.org/landmanagers.htm</a>.

I started the Autumnal "reaping" process on September 18. The process involved looking at caches that have been temporarily disabled for more than thirty days (91 caches) and caches with a growing string of "Didn't Find It" (DNF) logs (247 caches). I posted a Reviewer Note on each cache page requesting the Cache Owner to tend to the cache. If the cache does not receive Cache Owner maintenance OR the Cache Owner does not post a Note to the cache page stating their maintenance plan, the cache page will be archived during my next review cycle. The key for a Cache Owner to keep a cache with issues alive is to regularly communicate with the local Review and the caching community by posting notes on the cache page. No one likes to see a cache get archived,

but an even worse situation is for a missing cache to live on, frustrating cache seekers.

I also posted a note to 185 cache pages with the Needs Maintenance attribute with instruction about how to clear the attribute from the cache page if everything is all right with the cache. I will not take further action on these caches unless there are other issues such as a long-term "temporarily disabled" or growing DNF streak. The number of caches with this attribute has grown significantly because so many cachers are using the "Needs Maintenance" log instead of the "Didn't Find It" (DNF) log when they didn't find the cache. Cachers are reminded that the "Needs Maintenance" log should be used only if the cache is found and there are known maintenance issues. If the cache IS **NOT** found, the appropriate log is the "Didn't Find It" (DNF) log type. A cacher can't know if a cache needs maintenance if s/he hasn't actually seen the cache.

## What's in Your Geocaching Bag?

As an avid geocacher I take my geocaching very seriously, okay maybe not that seriously, but I do take my equipment seriously. I am a gadgetaholic! I have found it very interesting talking to people from other areas of the country about what each of us considers "essential" equipment. So what are my "essentials" You ask? My essentials have all happened due to various "things" that have happened to me while out geocaching. Sometimes these essentials are better known as Tools Of The Trade or TOTT. I have a small bag that I can grab, leave in my purse or toss in my pocket. In it is the handy and very necessary pair of disposable gloves. We Alaskan's put our hands in holes, cracks and crevices. I am not touching anything slimy, sticky or furry.

Next is the **log roller**. My husband is the king of nanos in the woods, which can drive a person insane. I never leave home without my log roller. It is not much fun to spend a lot of time manually rolling one of those suckers up and trying to get it back in the lid before putting the cache back into place. Inevitably you have spent quite a while already LOOKING for said cache...

Speaking of nano's, it's always good to have a pair of **tweezers** available for pulling that teeny tiny log out of the cache. I have found the sharper the better. I have to admit to it taking me awhile to get these in my bag. A lot of time has been

spent trying to bang the log out of the cache with little or no success.

After the log roller and tweezers would be the **writing implement**. Whether you are looking for the nano or the ammo can you have a good chance that the writing implement in the cache, provided there is one in there, won't work or the log will be damp. I try to carry a fine sharpie and a pencil to be sure I have my bases covered. Nothing is more frustrating than trying to sign the log with a stick and blueberry juice.

You will also want to make sure you have some sort of **flashlight**. I have found it doesn't matter if it is day or night the flashlight is great in the woods to point in that hole, crack or crevice BEFORE I stick my hand into it, right along with the stick you picked up off the ground to poke in that hole. You can never be too safe.

In an effort to carry a few less gadgets, I use my smart phone to take my geocaching photos, but you may want to carry a separate **camera**. I take pictures of the trail, views along the trail, signs, the geopets, geofriends and sometimes a cool cache container. Make sure to get a wide variety of photos that you will be able to submit several photos for the calendar contest. It's the best feeling to have your photo picked to be in a calendar and Alaska has so many aspects to share.

I always carry my **smart phone** and **GPS**. Make sure to toss in **spare batteries** for both your flashlight and your GPS. There is nothing more frustrating than getting within 500 feet of the cache and having your batteries die. However that is where the phone can come in. If for some reason you don't have spare batteries, the phone app will work to get you close enough to find that cache.

Then of course you are going to need some **swag**. There are lots of other items that people bring geocaching and whether you are caching in the city, on a trail, at night or up a mountain can make a big different to the "other" equipment you might want to use. Some other ideas might be: a **magnet**, a **retractable mirror**, a **grabber** (CITO), **headlamp** and a **UV light**. There are many more ideas out there about what the essential gear might be.

Of course many times this "small" bag gets thrown into a larger one with more tools. 'Be prepared' is an Alaskan Motto.

The idea was a good one. The timing wasn't the best in terms of the weather. Boy was it HOT and HUMID while we were there!! I swear it was a race between the heat and the humidity to see which could break 90 first.

We left Anchorage on a Thursday and arrived in Norfolk, VA Friday morning. After a short drive we were in Williamsburg. We were all really tired, so we decided not to do much. We found a nice restaurant and had something to eat to kill time before we could check into the hotel.

The next day, we went out to check out Williamsburg. While shopping for souvenirs, a clerk at one of the stores told us about a Saturday market to check out in the old part of town. So we went to check it out. While we were walking about the market, Beth asked me about any caches nearby. I pulled out the iPhone and opened the Geocaching

App. Up pops <u>GC1928</u> - #3 on DOG, a virtual cache right in front of where we were standing. Thomas Jefferson was very cooperative to pose for a picture with the kids.

Washington, D.C. was a lot of walking. We were there for 2 full days. The first day was spent going through the Smithsonian museums of Natural History, National Gallery of Art and Air and Space. The second day started with a tour of the White House and checking out the National Monuments (Vietnam, Lincoln, Korea and World War II). All of these are within the National Mall, which is part of the National Park Service. That means that there are no traditional caches to be found. Only those of the virtual nature. We were sur-

prised to see how many Earth caches there were. Several of the monuments and the Museum of Natural History had them.

Due to how much time we had, the only Earth cache that I did was the one that was around the National Museum of the American Indian, GC39QV8, North, South, East and West of the Moon. The EC visits all four stone Cardinal Direction Markers placed there. It was very interesting learning about the stones and the geology surrounding them. After completing the requirements for the EC, I spotted a multi cache nearby that started in front of the Air and Space Museum, GC908D, Solar Sailing. It was a planet walk. The same planet

walk that the one here in Anchorage was modeled after. This one was only 0.3 miles in length and had 6 stops, all virtual. So I did it. Again, there was something to learn. And it could be done while looking like any other tourist.

In Philadelphia, there weren't very many caches around the Liberty Bell or Independence Hall. But as we were walking about, Anthony, Annemarie and I all were conscripted into the Continental Army. We could not locate the spot that we were to meet the next morning at 5:00 am to begin our tour of duty. So we did not report. So far, no one has come after us. We also found the Rocky statue.

The highlight of our stay in the Outer Banks was going to Kitty Hawk, where GCB57D, Dawn of Aviation is located. The spot where the first motorized flights by the Wright Brothers happened. While we were there, we stopped in the Ranger Station and listened to the Ranger talk about the first flights. In the Station is replica of the plane that they flew. The replica was built for the 100th anniversary of their flight. The Ranger said that the original plane cost about \$731 to build. The replica cost \$1.2 million. Talk about inflation!



By the time our trip was over, we had found 108 caches over 15 days. We had found 6 different types (traditional, multi, virtual, mystery, web-cam and earth caches) in six states (Virginia, Maryland, Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and North Carolina) plus the District of Columbia.



## The Alaska State Star---- Caching Style!

Do all geoachers know about the Alaska State Star Caches?



All 51 'stars' are actually geo-puzzles – so when viewed on the Geocaching. com screen – they look like questionmarks in the shape of a star.....in the middle of Turnagain Arm! The middle star is: GC4Y33G, and is a Tracking Bug Hotel.

When looking at the Cache Page of each star, it will look very similar- with patriotic red, white and blue colors surrounding the text- which is also in red, white and blue and has a US Flag and Alaska Flag waving! Each cache page is a sight to behold in it-

self! Very nicely done cache pages – take a look at them!

Now—how does one go about getting all 51 caches? Well----it takes time, and patience, and puzzle-solving techniques! And---talking to other cachers! The caches themselves (once solved) are all located on the Bird-to-Gird bike path.

(Am I giving too much away?)

The Bird to Gird Pathway parallels State Route 1 along the Turnagain Arm of an inlet off the Gulf of Alaska. The paved path runs for 13 miles between shore and glacier-covered mountains. You're likely to see wildlife along the way, including beluga whales and other sea mammals in the inlet and big game on dry land, such as Dall sheep.

Dramatic views of the water and mountains led to the designation of the Seward Scenic Highway; part of the trail uses the old road, which was rerouted, and part of the trail occupies an old rail bed. Along the trail you'll find interpretive signs of the interesting geologic features, and the path leads to other local trails in Gird-

wood, Bird and Indian. There's a campground in Bird and covered rest areas with picnic tables along the route.

Many of the cache puzzles will have to be solved while on the bike path as knowledge will be gained (reading the well-placed Interpretive Signs) as each puzzle is completed and cache is found!

It took this cacher 3 times on the trail (twice with bikes and once walking) to locate all the caches and sign the logs. That did not count for the time spent on solving each puzzle cache! It's best done with friends----thank you to my friends who initiated and helped and accompanied me on this quest!

This USA 50 State Star GeoArt is a great addition for the caching community! Consider giving it a try! By the way---if you admire these 51 STAR caches—you can give a thanks to Alaska's own AKGH519!

Note: The Bird-To-Gird Bike Trail Alaska comes with its own set of RISKS including avalanches, bear and moose. Note the seasonal access attribute. The area of the star is seasonally closed for avalanches. Should you find signage stating the trail is closed, do not ignore it. This trail may also be closed in winter.

The awards are presented by C.A.C.H.E – Celebrate Alaskan Caching Hallmark Experiences.


This effort is spear-headed by Blazingpathways and Mrs Cohofive.


Blazingpathways introduced each awardee by describing their caching accomplishments and letting the guests guess which cacher fit the description!


Many AHH's were heard as the cacher name was announced!

On the outside of the cache, you must write "Alaska State Parks Permit #15-KA-1994 Geocache AK" in permanent marking. The cache listing must state "Cache placed under GeocacheAlaska! Park Use Permit #15-KA-1994" within the description section. Before submitting a cache listing within one of the parks, please thoroughly read the complete list of stipulations in the permit, which may be <a href="downloaded">downloaded</a> from the GeoacheAlaska! website.
