President's Corner

Fall has brought more than termination dust to the mountains, which means we're just a few weeks from having snow on the ground!

That's good news for winter sports enthusiasts such as skiers and dog mushers. It also means we geocachers have to exercise good judgement when we take advantage of winter trails, checking to make sure trail user assignments allow us to be on that particular trail in the wintertime. It's important to understand that land managers dedicate entire trail networks to specific user groups in the wintertime, for both safety and equity reasons. For example, you may not be aware that the Nordic Ski Association of Anchorage (NSAA) provides for the creation and maintenance of the bulk of the pathways traversing city parks, grooming the trails for cross-country skiing on a regular basis across the winter. NSAA members fund that work through their membership dues, and their equity investment is matchless and worthy of respect! Additionally, the damage created by foot traffic on groomed trails not only costs money to repair, it creates safety hazards for cross-country skiers. Worse, foot traffic on trails dedicated to winter dog sports such as mushing and skijoring not only makes safety hazards for the canine athletes, it puts the walkers at risk as well. Dog teams are quiet and quick, overtaking or surprising walkers 'in the way' on trails with little time to react or get out of the way. Be courteous, fair and concerned for other trail users - check the trail status before you just stroll on down that groomed pathway. Your correct behavior builds up a good impression of geocaching and helps keep winter sports trails safe to use!

Reviewer's Corner

Bots, Reservations, and Fall Reaping

Beginning a few months ago, Groundspeak started sending automated e-mails to Cache Owners of caches that may have maintenance issues. The e-mails are sent based on criteria established by Groundspeak after polling the Community Volunteer Reviewers for things they consider when looking for caches that might need the Cache Owner's attention. The system as extensively tested with the results being verified by the Reviewers before going live.

These bot-generated e-mails are merely friendly reminders to Cache Owners that they may be due for a cache maintenance visit in the near future. No further automated action will be taken and a living/breathing Reviewer will ultimately look at a cache page before a follow-up Reviewer Note is written to the page to seek clarification of the cache status or to begin the reaping (archival) process. This makes it possible for a dialog to happen between the Cache Owner and the Reviewer before any next steps are taken.

As more and more cachers try to fit more and more caches into some urban areas, some Cache Owners request a coordinate check before creating and placing their cache container. I'm happy to provide the coordinate check because it saves time and effort for both the Reviewer and the Cache Hider if there is a proximity error with the first location. Simply submit a new cache page with the desired coordinates and a Reviewer Note that states "Coordinate check only, do not publish." I will review the location, disable the cache page, and verify the location is available. If the location is available, the Cache Owner merely has enable the cache page once the cache is ready to be found to return the cache page to the review queue. That said, Cache Owners are reminded that Groundspeak's <u>Guideline</u> states "geocache listings should be submitted for review within three months of creation," so a location cannot be reserved indefinitely.

Hello < Cacher Name Redacted>,

Your geocache, REDACTED, looks like it might need some attention. The recent logs may contain more details about what sort of maintenance needs to be performed. This could be anything from a new logbook to replacing a missing container. Here are a few options for what to do now:

- Maintenance: Visit your geocache, make any needed repairs, and post an "Owner Maintenance" log so the community knows it's available to find.
- Disable: If you cannot check on your geocache within a reasonable amount of time, please disable your geocache listing. Once you perform maintenance, you can enable it and post an "Owner Maintenance" log.
- Archive: If you decide it is time for your geocache to be permanently retired, please archive the listing and retrieve all physical stages.

On Friday we set out, planning on getting as close as we could to the border. We ended up sleeping in the car somewhere before Tok.






Toast. This began the downward spiral of eggs and cheese.



Campbell Tract CITO

The first Saturday of fall found GeocacheAlaska! at the BLM Campbell Tract. We began the day with an event to welcome cachers to the Tract and its wide array of geocache placements, and ended the day with a CITO Activity as part of the first-ever Global CITO Week. In between the two events, members of GeocacheAlaska! Inc. provided hands-on instruction about geocaching to visitors attending National Public Lands Day activities at the BLM Campbell Science Center.

The morning event provided orientation regarding the Campbell Tract and safe use of its trails. Equipped with a wide variety of facilities, including an active runway, the Campbell Tract is a BLM installation supporting land management activities on federal lands across the state (including fighting wildfires). Twelve miles of well-marked and maintained trails spread across the Tract's 730 acres of wildlife-laden forested lands on Anchorage's east side, including Campbell Creek. The BLM Campbell Science Center is an educational campus now celebrating its twentieth year of providing outdoor education to Alaskans. In partnership with a wide range of outdoor organizations (including GeocacheAlaska! Inc.), publicly-accessed activities here include observation of the National Public

Lands Day, operation of a wide variety of day camps for children, and training talks regarding wildlife, botany and geology of Alaska.

The afternoon event gave attendees an opportunity to participate in the September 2016 CITO Week sponsored by Groundspeak, with a souvenir awarded to participants' online profile. Land managers at BLM





Campbell Tract sincerely appreciated the

wide-ranging CITO effort put on by more than three dozen cachers at the two most-used trailheads and across the area used by the National Public Lands Day participants. While the haul was not heavy, there were plenty of small items collected and hauled away by GeocacheAlaska! Inc's members and guests at the Cache In Trash Out event.

Members volunteered to man an information station which introduced National Public Lands Day attendees to geocaching. Participants were shown how to operate a GPS loaded with the coordinates of 3 temporary caches and one

actual geocache. Members often accompanied attendees to help them learn along the trail, and touted the virtues of the newly-upgraded cell phone app for geocaching too. STATE PARKS PERMITS

Caches may be published within Alaska State Parks! All caches must have the permit number on the inside of the cache along with the cache owner's contact information. On the outside of the cache, you must write "Alaska State Parks Permit #15-KA-1994 Geocache AK" in permanent marking. The cache listing must state "Cache placed under GeocacheAlaska! Park Use Permit #15-KA-1994" within the description section.
